(3rd). General Report.

We began the Quarter with an attendance of 91 children (44 Boys, 47 Girls), and finished with an attendance of 103 (46 Boys, 57 Girls). The average number present (in all) was 92 for each week, but the strict daily and weekly average would be but 76. As far as we can ascertain, about 23 have been admitted during the Quarter, and about 10 have left, but this we hope to be able to state with more certainty in the next Quarter's report. Of those who have left, one boy has gone to Bath to reside with a relation, who has offered to teach him the trade of a shoemaker; another has gone to another School, having errands frequently during the week in the place near which he attends, others are helping their parents in various ways. The School has in general proceeded satisfactorily during the Quarter, and the Children are generally improving in their Attainments. The enlargement of the play-ground has been of great advantage to the School, and the alternate weekly cleansing of the Schoolrooms has been very beneficial in every respect. A few repairs etc. will be required before the Winter season comes on, as the pointing etc. of the Walls of the play-ground, the Whitewashing the Inside Walls of the Schoolroom, and a few of the panes of Glass in the Windows will require to be replaced etc. etc. Signed. 3rd. Historical and General.

The present Quarter began with an attendance of 103, and ended with 78; the decrease at the end of the Quarter being occasioned by the Gleaning and potatoe digging. The average number present at all during each Week of the Quarter was 43 Boys and 54 Girls, making a total of 97, but the strict daily and weekly average would be 77. About 34 children have been admitted during the Quarter, and about 35 have left. Of those who have left, 4 Boys have gone to Work at the Collieries, 2 Girls have gone to Service, and others assisting their parents in various ways, being wanted at home; 5 by reason of Sickness. The children generally are improving in their attainments, and the School has proceeded in a satisfactory manner. The Walls of the play-ground have been repaired, the School-rooms etc. have been Whitewashed and Cleaned throughout, and the Windows are in course of repair. The enlargement of the play-ground still continues to be beneficial to the School, as tending to the development of the physical faculties, and general healthiness of the children; the alternate weekly cleansing still continues to be an advantage in every respect, as tending to health and cleanliness. A few Attendance and pence Registers will be required before the close of the present year.

3. General Remarks.

From the foregoing tables it will be seen that the present School Quarter opened with an attendance of 42 Boys and 48 girls, making a total of 90 children, and closed with 41 Boys and 43 Girls making altogether an attendance of 84 children during the last week of the Quarter, being the week previous to Christmas Day. The weather in the week last named was somewhat stormy and wet, and the roads being very dirty in consequence, we had not nearly so many children present, as in the previous and other weeks of the Quarter. This also had some effect on the Averages, making them less than in all human probability than they otherwise might have been. The Average Number present during the Quarter was 96, but the strict daily and weekly average was only 81. The number admitted during the Quarter has been about 28, and about 34 were absent in the last week, some from sickness, others from weather, bad shoes etc., and others doing something or other for their parents at home.

The Quarter opened with an attendance of 102 children (B.48, G.54), and closed with 98 (B.50, G.48). There were 21 admitted in the course of the Quarter, and at the end of it there were 25 absent out of 123, which was the number on the Registers in the last Week of the Quarter. The average number present at all during each week of the Qtr. was 92, but the strict daily & Weekly average attendance was 80. This last number would be sufficient to obtain 2 Pupil Teachers according to the latest regulations of Her Majesty's Committee of Council on Education, if the School be considered and represented as a Mixed School. The children generally are improving & progressing in every branch of their instruction, and the School has proceeded in a pleasant and satisfactory manner. The decrease in the last week of the Quarter was chiefly occasioned by the commencement of the potatoe-planting and other necessary Garden-work which at this season of the year has generally the effect of lessening the attendance.

The number on the Books at the beginning of the Quarter was 99 (B.50, G.49) and at the close it amounted to 123 (B.64, G.59). We commenced the Quarter with an attendance of 90, and finished with 75, the decrease being occasioned by the continuance of the Garden-work, such as the planting of the Late-crop of Potatoes, hacking, weeding, ridging up etc. and also by the commencement of the Haymaking at the end of the Quarter. As nearly as can be ascertained about 24 have been admitted, and about 25 have left. Of these some of the Girls have gone to Service, others are employed in various ways by Parents or Friends at home, and some may probably return at some future time. The School has gone on pretty well during the Quarter, and the children in general are improving and progressing in their studies. A few slight repairs will be required in the Walls of the play-ground which should, if possible, be done before the fall of the year, or before the frosts begin to set in. The alternate weekly cleansing of the School-rooms still continues to be very well done, and is very beneficial in every respect of health and cleanliness.

3rd. Numerical and General Remarks.

From the above tables it will be seen that at the opening of the Quarter there were present 84 children (B.43,G.41) and at the close the numbers on the Books were 128, and there were present 39 Boys and 45 [46] Girls making a total of 85. During that time about 44 were admitted, and as far as can be seen about 32 have left, some for work, others for service, others employed at home in various ways & absent from other causes etc. The average number present at all was 88, the strict daily and weekly average was 74, and the number of Days each child present at all attended on the average was 3¹/₂ Days per W'k. The School has, on the whole, gone on pretty well during the Quarter and the children are generally improving and progressing. New Register Books will shortly be required, but whether these should for the future be kept so as to open and close with the date at which returns for the Capitation Grant are made up, has yet to be decided; if so, they will be required as soon as they can be procured. Four Candidates are being prepared for pupil Teacherships, their examination generally takes place at Bath about the second week in Nov'r; if it is at the same time this year, the arrangements for conveying them to the place will have to be considered and decided upon.

3rd. Numerical and General Remarks.

The Quarter opened with an attendance of 36 Boys and 46 Girls and these numbers were pretty well sustained until the 2nd Week in December, when the weather became intensely cold and combined with sickness amongst the children, in some respects had the effect of decreasing the attendance to a considerable extent, especially amongst the infant and junior portion of the children, as may be seen on reference to the Class Registers. From this cause the average attendance is somewhat less than in the corresponding Quarter of last year, but yet (as nearly as I can recollect) it is somewhat better than in nearly similar weather about 5 years ago. The averages have not been calculated with the last week of the Quarter, as the small attendance during that week (on account of the cold) would have so reduced them, that they would not have been a fair specimen of the average attendance during the Quarter. The Capitation Grant was claimed in respect of 18 boys and 21 girls; their names will be seen in the next page of the Report. If these children were to be openly rewarded in the School by some little present to each, it might conduce to a better attendance next year. One Pupil Teacher has been appointed, and he seems likely to be very useful, and to get on pretty well both in his teaching and studies. A small Work Table would be useful for the lower part of the Girls' School.

3rd. Numerical and General Remarks.

The present quarter opened with an attendance of 45 Boys & 36 Girls making a Total of eighty one, and closed with the number of 37 Boys and 44 Girls, amounting as before to eighty one. The average number present at all during the Quarter was 85, but the strict daily & weekly average was seventy five. The number of days attended by each child present at all on the average was 4: this is a slight improvement in respect of regularity, which we trust will continue. In the last week of the Quarter the average attendance was reduced very considerably by the commencement of the potatoe planting and other Garden work, as is usual at this time: two boys have gone to work at the Collieries, one girl apprenticed to a Dressmaker, and others employed for nursing & other occupations at home. On the whole the School continues to progress pretty favourably.

There were present at the beginning of the Quarter, 35 Boys and 47 Girls making a total of 82 children; and at it's close there were 84 present, being 42 Boys, and 42 Girls. The average number present at all for each week was 80, the daily and weekly average 70, and the average number of Days attended by each child present at all rather more than 3 1/2 Days per week. [3]. General Remarks.

At the opening of the Quarter, many of the elder children were still employed with the Potatoe and Apple-picking; this in some measure lessened the attendance during the first six weeks, after which there was an increase until the 19th December, when the cold and snowy weather had the effect, in some degree of lessening the attendance amongst the Junior portion or section of the School. The numbers on the Books, the attendance at the opening and close, the average numbers, and the number of days attended (on an average) by each child present at all, may be seen in the Statistical Table given above. The Actual and Average attendance obtained each week, is shewn in the Financial Table at the beginning of the Report. The names etc. of the Capitation List are shewn on the next page; our proportion is greater than in some other schools in the neighbourhood; the attendance, I find has this year fluctuated very much in most Schools. The rewards given to these children at the beginning of the Year seem to have been very beneficial.

The windows are in course of repair but not yet completed; a few stones required to be replaced on the top of the outside walls of the playground.

3rd. Historical and General Remarks.

The Quarter opened with an attendance of 32 boys and 45 girls, and closed with 36 boys and 40 girls, making a total of 76. At the close of the Quarter the measles made it's appearance amongst the children, and contributed in some measure to lessen the attendance. It still prevails to some extent amongst the younger portion of the population. The Capitation Grant was obtained in respect of 19 Boys and 26 Girls; their names are shewn in the next page of the report. The average number present at all was 82, daily and weekly average 68, and the average number of days attended by each child present at all, was about 4.204 days per week. The cold weather and sickness during the last 5 weeks of the Quarter, seem to have had some little effect in reducing the average attendance of the Junior section of the School.

2. General Remarks.

At the beginning of the Quarter, the Hooping Cough prevailed in the School to some little extent, and continued for some time amongst the younger children, reducing considerably the attendance for that time; then at the beginning of March the usual garden occupations commenced, and thinned off the Juvenile portion of the School. Notwithstanding all these drawbacks the children are, we think, improving in their attainments, and the school has proceeded with some degree of pleasure and satisfaction. The new Class Registers spoken of in the last Quarterly Report, being urgently required, have been procured, the other Books mentioned there have not as yet been purchased, because we could manage to get on without them, still, according to the Terms of the New Code they seem to be absolutely required, and if the School is not furnished with them, some part of the Annual Grants may be lost. The Casements of two of the windows in the Girls' room require to be repaired, and their fastenings to their frame-work better secured; also the Fire-Grates of both the Boys' School, and Committee-room are in a somewhat dilapidated state, and perhaps rather unsafe, if not speedily repaired. The Pupil Teacher seems to be doing a little better in his studies than some time ago; we trust he will continue to improve and do well.

2nd P't. Historical and General Remarks.

There has been a great deal of Sickness amongst the children at various times during the Quarter; a case of small-pox at the house of one, and of reputed fever at another. During the first three weeks of the Quarter, the Gardening employed a great many of the children, and at the close, the Haymaking began, and was the means of absorbing in one way or another a great many of the children, the mothers going out to work in the hay-field, and the children being then required for various services at home. If they could possibly be procured, a few coloured prints of Animals, and Illustrations of Scripture Stories would be very useful for the Instruction of the Infant Section of the School. These might be procured at a moderate rate from the depository of the Christian Knowledge Society: if it were only two or three of these that could thus be procured, they might form

some attraction to that portion of the School. The fire-grates of both the Boys' school & Committee-room require to be re-set previous to the fall of the year, as the side-pieces have become loose and obliged to be taken down; also the Casements of two of the windows in the Girls' room require a little repairing previous to the winter. The children are in many respects improving in their studies, and the School has proceeded in an agreeable and satisfactory manner.

2nd. General Remarks.

The present quarter opened with the commencement of the Haymaking, which continued during the first three weeks, and was the means of employing many of the children with that & other occupations consequent hereon. After that time the attendance increased and continued to be more numerous until the commencement of the Potatoe-digging, which was the means of again reducing it's numbers. There have been also some few cases of sickness, but not to the extent to which it prevailed during the previous quarter. The school-rooms have been very greatly improved by being whitewashed, coloured, and cleansed throughout, also the Boys' room by a simple plan of Ventilation, which we trust will be very beneficial to the health of the children. Two of the casements of the windows in the Girls' room are loose, and if they conveniently can, should be repaired previous to the winter, also a door close to the coal-house. The school has gone on very fairly during the quarter, and the children and Teacher seem to be improving & progressing in their attainments.

2nd. Historical and General.

There has been very little sickness or interruption of any kind in the progress of the school during the Quarter. After the first week (which was the closing up of the Potatoe-digging) the numbers increased, and continued favourable, in that respect, with one exception, to the close. This increase may, in all probability, have been in consequence of the School-Festival given in the course of the previous Quarter, which seemed to exert a very beneficial influence upon every one connected with the school. The casements of the windows on the north side of the Girls' room, and also one in the western lobby still require a few slight repairs, and having become loose in that portion of the lead-work which should be fastened to the iron framing, cause a very unpleasant sensation of coldness throughout the room. The Glazier has expressed the opinion that the whole of the windows require re-leading, as they are now getting loose from the wearing away of the lead, especially on the North-side; whether this opinion is well founded or not remains to be proved etc. etc. In accordance with a suggestion by Rev'd G.R. TAYLOR the Annual Report has been deferred until Midsummer, as H.M. Inspector will be coming at that time, and the financial statements may thus be more readily filled up.

2nd. Historical and General.

The Quarter opened with a small attendance, a hard frost having set in, and the weather being intensely cold and sickness beginning to prevail amongst the junior classes of the school, which continued to a great extent combined with cold and wet weather during many weeks of the quarter, then at the closing week, field-garden operations commenced and drew off those of the children who were urgently required by their parents to assist in digging up ground, collecting manure from the roads, pulling up weeds, sorting out potatoes and other necessary occupations etc. etc. One boy and three girls have gone to service during the Quarter, others as mentioned above kept at home by Fever and other diseases, and some others detained by nursing and other necessary employments. Repairs are still very urgently required to the Casements on the North side, and the Lead-work in general of nearly all the Windows throughout the Building: the Lead-work being very much worn so that in some places the Wind, rain & Snow occasionally drives itself fairly into the rooms, and the temperature is then intensely cold, sometimes diminishing the attendance of some of the children. We have often felt a desire for a Cottage in a corner of the School premises; if it could be granted, it would be convenient in many ways. The Committee of Council, R.C. Art. 23, would make a grant to the extent of £65 towards this object, and the remainder, in course of time, would be re-imbursed to the School Funds by a corresponding diminution of the Salary at present paid.

2nd. Remarks etc.

The usual garden operations were in full play at the commencement of the quarter, especially during the second week, and many children were thereby absorbed from the school. After this the numbers increased steadily etc. until haymaking season, when the attendance was again as usual reduced to a lower temperature. The school has gone on very favourably during the Quarter, & progress seems to have been made in the attainments of those who attend regularly at the school. A grant of Bibles and Testaments is in very urgent request: those in present use were procured by Rev'd H.H. MOGG in the year 1854 by a Grant from the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge. They are now very nearly worn out; and in the use of them the leaves frequently drop & fly about, and occasion very serious interruptions & unpleasancies in the course of the Scripture Lessons. If a similar Grant could be obtained by J. REES MOGG Esq're in consideration of, or through his subscription they would be very useful and conduce to the welfare of the school. The casements of the north side of the Girls' room and lobby are still out

of repair, and if they possibly can should be repaired before the cold weather comes on; also if possible a few coloured prints for the Illustration of events etc. taught from the Holy Scriptures and lessons in Natural History seem very desirable.

2nd. Remarks etc.

There has been some little sickness during the Quarter, in one family a case of Fever, with others of other kinds, and this combined with the Haymaking at the beginning, and the Potatoe-digging and Apple-gathering at the end of the Quarter, have been the means of thinning off, to a great extent the attendance of the children. Two boys have gone to work during the Quarter, one girl to service, and others have been required at home by peculiar circumstances in the work of their parents. The casements of the windows, especially in the Girls' room

and lobby still require to be repaired, being quite loose at the top, & almost detached from the iron frame work of the casement, the fastenings being rusted or worn away; if possible they should be re-fastened, and a few broken panes of glass in each room re-placed before the cold weather sets in. Two or three stones also on the tops of the walls of the playground require to be re-set. The Pupil Teacher, having passed the last examination required in the course of his apprenticeship in the month of July is now preparing for the examination required for admission to a Training College; we trust he will be successful, at least, in a moderate degree.

3rd. General Remarks etc.

At the commencement of the Quarter, the Potatoe-digging was scarcely finished, and the Apple-gathering from the abundance of the crop, lasted to a very late period; and these, combined with sickness, especially fever, at the homes of some of the children, combined to lessen to some little extent the numbers in attendance. One girl has gone to an apprenticeship, to learn the trade of a straw-bonnet maker, another to service, a boy to work at the Collieries, and others required at home with nursing and other indispensable & unavoidable domestic occupations.
