1854 November 15. At a Meeting of the School Committee

J.U. SCOBELL Esq. and the Rev'd L. RICH were unanimously elected Members.

On referring to a resolution passed 11th January last it appeared to have been agreed in consequence of deficiency in the Funds that the Subscribers should be requested to increase their Subscriptions, which was done by four persons only, vizt. Capt. SCOBELL, Mr SCOBELL, Rev'd H.H. MOGG & Mr REES-MOGG, who raised their payments from £5 to £6 per annum.

Resolved that Mr RICH be requested to apply, in such way as he may think proper to the other Subscribers, and to the Owners & Occupiers of property in the Parish, for the purpose of increasing the present and obtaining new Subscriptions.

Resolved that it is desirable that a portion of the Government educational grant should be obtained for this School, and that it be suggested to Mr NEEDES that he should prepare himself for examination as a certificated Schoolmaster.

The Rev'd E. GILLSON, Vicar, was unanimously appointed on the Committee.

It appeared by inspection of the Accounts that the receipts for the past year to 1st January last had been £47.15.5 and the expenditure (including the last year's balance) £52. 6. 5½, leaving a balance against the School of £4.11.0½.

The statements did not show the exact amounts received and paid, the payments to the Schoolmaster and Schoolmistress being, in some cases, only the balances due to them, after deducting the Childrens' pence recovered by them, which will be remedied in future accounts.

Mr NEEDES, having attended the Committee, stated that he had not yet taken steps towards preparation for examination as a certificated Schoolmaster, but he engaged to do so before the expiration of the present year.

At a **Meeting of the Committee of Management** held this day,

Present - Capt. SCOBELL R.N. in the Chair, Rev'd E.C. STREETEN, Vicar, Mr James COX, Churchwarden. The Report of H.M. Inspector [*Rev. H.B. BARRY*] was read and received.

The Accounts of the past year were examined, when it was found that at the commencement of the current year, July 1st, a Balance of £3. 9. 8½ was carried forward to the Credit of the School, but that there were outstanding liabilities in Salaries, Bills etc. to the amount of between £13 and £14, and it was **Resolved** That efforts should be made to increase the Funds by endeavouring to obtain new subscribers.

The general state of the school having been taken into consideration, it was also **Resolved** That Notice should be given respectively to Miss Emily COLLYER, the Mistress, and to Martha COLLINS, the Assistant Mistress, to terminate the present agreement with them, and that steps should forthwith be taken to make an appointment with a Master and Mistress with a view to the improvement of the School.

The object for which the above Meeting was convened, and the position in which the School was placed, having been fully stated and discussed, it was suggested that there might be a voluntary Rate or that there might be a general Subscription throughout the Parish. The latter suggestion was adopted, and it was finally **resolved** That a general Subscription be made throughout the Parish and that Messrs James COX & Joseph POOLE be requested to collect such Subscriptions, and make known the result to the Rev. Mr STREETEN, the Secretary.

Nearly all who were present then gave in their names as Subscribers and the Meeting terminated.

A Meeting of the Committee of Management having been duly called and held on this 10th day of March 1876.

Present - Rev'd E.C. STREETEN in the Chair, Barton J.L. [*should be L.J.*] SCOBELL Esq., Mr James COX.
A request from Mr & Mrs TAYLOR that they might be allowed to accept a situation near their friends in Yorkshire was laid before the Meeting, and after due consideration it was **resolved** as embodied in the following letter:

"Vicarage, High Littleton, Bristol.
March 10th 1876.

Sir,

Mr and Mrs TAYLOR having expressed a very natural wish to seek the appointment of Master and Mistress to your Schools at Stainforth, on account of it's being near her relatives and being, as I learn, in correspondence with you respecting this appointment, I have summoned a Meeting of our Committee of Management which after due consideration of the case Resolved:

- i. That we could not allow Mr & Mrs TAYLOR to leave without due Notice according to the terms of agreement under which they were engaged (a copy of which I subjoin) unless we could first meet with duly qualified Teachers, such as we should approve, to take their place without interrupting the course of instruction in our Schools - But,
- ii. That being desirous of showing every kindness we can to Mr & Mrs TAYLOR and of meeting their wishes as far as it may be consistent with the claims of our own schools, we will, if desired, take active steps at once to try and obtain efficient Teachers such as we should approve, and then, if we can succeed, release them (Mr and Mrs TAYLOR) from their engagement to us - And,
- iii. That it would be desirable for me to communicate with you to that effect.

The Committee of Management have thought this the best mode of proceeding with the case - and should you therefore be willing to wait the result either of our meeting with suitable Teachers, or in the event of our being unsuccessful, till the time in July when Notice to leave from Mr & Mrs TAYLOR would take effect, we, on your writing to say so, will take immediate steps to see if anything can be done to comply with their wishes.

In behalf of Mr & Mrs TAYLOR I can only refer you to the Testimonial I gave them and repeat that if successful in their application to you, we shall be very sorry to lose them.

A Meeting of the Committee having been convened for and met on this day at which there were present:

The Rev. E.C. STREETEN, in the Chair, Barton L.S. [*should be J.*] SCOBELL Esq. & Mr James COX.

It was **resolved** that Mr Joseph POOLE be elected a Member of the Committee of Management.

Mr Joseph POOLE having been thereupon called in; The Accounts for the past year ending June 30th were audited and accepted - there being a Balance of £34 due to the Treasurer.

The average Attendance being in Excess of the number allowed by the Code of Regulation issued by the Committee of Privy Council on Education, the subject was taken into consideration. Two ways of meeting the difficulty were laid before the Meeting - viz. either to increase the Staff of Teachers or to dismiss the pupils who were residing without the School District. It was **resolved** after discussion to let this question stand over till after H.M. Inspector's Report with any remarks that might be made thereon should be received from the Committee of Privy Council on Education.

The increase of accommodation also especially for the 1st Class was submitted and considered by the Meeting and it was **resolved** to add to and enlarge the Desk accommodation.

It was further **resolved** - That the School Premises should be insured in the sum of £400, the Secretary being authorized to effect such Insurance.

No Meeting of the Committee having been held subsequent to the last foregoing entry dated July 15th 1879, chiefly on account of the difficulty of convening one when it might have been desirable - It was thought advisable to have a Meeting of the Committee, consisting at the time of the Rev. the Vicar, Lieut. Col. SCOBELL & Mr James COX, Church Wardens, and Mr George E. COWEN, To consider what it might be desirable to do in consequence of an adverse Decision that had been passed at Petty Sessions at Temple Cloud on Tuesday the 10th instant, respecting the Schoolmaster, Mr John Colston MEREDITH in the case of Henry CHIVERS v Mr John MER(ER)EDITH.

Such Meeting of the Committee was accordingly convened to be held at the Vicarage on this day, Saturday 14th day of May at 7 o'clock in the evening.

There were present at it The Rev'd the Vicar in the Chair, Lieut. Col. SCOBELL & Mr James COX, Churchwardens.

The circumstances of such Decision were discussed and It was **resolved** "That in case of the necessity of corporal punishment, such punishment shall be inflicted only by the Head Master and upon the following morning."

It was also **resolved** "That the number of members of the Committee should be increased to seven. The new members elected were Charles GOOD Esq., Mr Robert JAMES and Mr Charles DOMAN." (*signed*) Edm'd C. STREETEN, Chairman.

May 25th 1887.

The additional members mentioned in the foregoing minutes as having been elected and the number having been thus increased to seven, it was thought desirable that a Meeting of the Committee as now constituted should be held as soon as it might be convenient.

Notices were accordingly issued for a **Meeting** to be held at the Vicarage on this day, May 25th 1887, at seven o'clock in the evening.

Responding to these Notices there were present: The Rev'd the Vicar in the Chair, Lieut. Col. SCOBELL & Mr James COX, Churchwardens, Mr George E. COWEN, Charles GOOD Esq., Mr Charles DOMAN.

There were four subjects for discussion entered on the Agenda Paper; One, the 2nd - referring to charges founded on recourses which it presumed would be brought forward. It was virtually withdrawn and was not discussed. Another, the 3rd - The Custody of the Minute Book and other Documents of the School - Whether any Member of the Committee could require such Book or Documents to be handed over to him for private inspection at his own home. Another, the 4[th] - respecting certain repairs of the School Repair (*sic*). There was no positive Resolution passed on either of these subjects, but instructions were given to have such repairs attended to and there seemed a pretty general opinion that a member of the Committee could not require The Minute Book and other Documents to be given up to him for private examination.

These latter subjects having been thus disposed of it then became the Chairman's duty to bring before the Meeting the Schoolmaster case with respect to the adverse decision delivered by the Chairman at the Petty Sessions held at Temple Cloud on 10th May 1887.

He, the Chairman of [the] School Committee, had received, very serious and important information respecting the witnesses who had given evidence against the Schoolmaster at the trial on the 10th May. Those witnesses, 2 girls and 3 boys confessed in detail, separately, and yet without variation, that the evidence they gave in Court was false, and that they gave that false evidence at the instigation of the Parents of the boy Joseph CHIVERS. He the Chairman had documents setting out all this as true, and signed by each child. These documents were read out in extenso to the Committee, to the astonishment of all, but still lest there should have been any

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tampering with the witnesses, it was decided to adjourn the Meeting at 10 o'clock on the following day that the children might be examined by the Committee.

On assembling at that time on now 26th day of May, three of the children, all we could get, the others not being at school and too far off to get at conveniently, questioned by several of the Committee, so clearly confirmed all they had confessed, and that they had not been induced by fear of Mr MEREDITH in taking their evidence down, the Committee were so satisfied that they authorized the Chairman to tell Mr & Mrs MEREDITH, that they, the Committee, had carefully investigated the case, were fully satisfied respecting it, and that they thought they Mr & Mrs MEREDITH were doing right in carrying the case on, as they heard they were doing, to clear his character.

A Meeting of the Managers of the High Littleton School was held this day at High Littleton House at 7 p.m.

Present - The Rev. Ambrose FOSTER, Vicar, in the Chair, Charles GOOD Esq., Mr Charles DOMAN, Mr Robert JAMES.

Moved by Mr GOOD, seconded by Mr DOMAN, that the name of Mr G. COWEN be added to the Board, he having resigned since the last meeting. Carried. Mr COWEN then joined the meeting.

Moved by Mr DOMAN, Mr JAMES seconding, that Mr G. CARTER be appointed a Manager. Carried.

Moved by Mr DOMAN, Mr JAMES seconding, that Mr John HARRISON be appointed a Manager. Carried.

Moved by Mr GOOD, Mr DOMAN seconding, that J.S. [*should be Mr S.J.*] BODY be appointed a Manager. Carried.

Moved by Mr JAMES, Mr COWEN seconding, that Mr C. POW be appointed a Member. Carried.

Mr GOOD, who had been acting as Treasurer since the death of the late Vicar, Rev. E.C. STREETEN, presented the accounts for the year which had been duly audited by Mr COWEN and the same were approved & accepted.

Mr GOOD explained that a debt of £150. 4. 2 due the late Vicar had been cancelled by his Executors. The amount of Receipts for the year ending 30 June 1891 was £334. 4. 2 and the Expenditure £359. 0. 1½, shewing an adverse balance of £24.15.11, which was accounted for by 5 quarters' salaries having been paid during the financial year ending June 30 1891, only 3 quarters' salaries having been paid in last financial year.

The forms prescribed by the Education department were then examined and signed by the Managers, Mr GOOD being authorized to receive the coming grant.

It was proposed by Mr GOOD, seconded by Mr COWEN, That the drain from the School Master's House be connected with a drain from the Vicarage now in course of construction and that the extra cost incurred by the use of a larger pipe be defrayed out of School Funds. Carried.

The Committee agreed that 2/6 a week be allowed to the school cleaner to include the cost of soap, soda, flannel & dusters, but exclusive of brooms, brushes & fire lighters.

It was also agreed that 2s.- a week be allowed to the Monitress [*E. QUARMAN*] instead of 1/- as heretofore. (*signed*) Ambrose M. FOSTER, Chairman.

In the back of the Cash Book are printed forms of "Account of the Income and Expenditure of the High Littleton National School for the year ending June 30th 18--". The earliest surviving copy is for 1891-2 but no more survive until 1897-8.

High Littleton National School.

A Meeting of the Managers was held in the School Room on Wednesday Evening July 6th 1892.

Present - Rev. A.M. FOSTER, Mr James COX, Mr Samuel J. BODY, Mr George CARTER.

The Accounts for the Year ending 30th June had been audited by Mr Egbert SPEAR & were presented. The Year had begun with an Adverse balance of £24.16. 0½ [slight difference from last report on Accounts] & ended with an adverse balance of £10.19. 7½ & this amount would be met by the balance of the Fee Grant due on account of the increased average attendance.

The Examination Schedule was compared with the Registers and Form IX was completed & signed.

The Average attendance in the Mixed School was 91.8 and exceeded the proper proportion for the Teaching Staff. It was therefore decided to have a Pupil Teacher, and the Chairman was authorized to make enquiries of the Parents of one who was understood to wish to become a Pupil Teacher.

High Littleton National School.

A Meeting of the Managers was held in the School Room on Friday Evening September 9th 1892.

Present - The Vicar, in the Chair, Mr George CARTER, Colonel SCOBELL, Mr S.J. BODY, Mr Robert JAMES, Mr James COX & Mr G.E. COWEN.

The Report of H.M. Inspector was presented & read, and much discussion followed. The feeling of the Managers was at length framed into a **Resolution**.

Proposed by Mr James COX & seconded by Mr S.J. BODY "That Mr & Mrs DEAKIN be requested to resign, & failing this that notice be given them to leave." The following amendment was then proposed by the Vicar & seconded by Mr Robert JAMES "That Mr & Mrs DEAKIN be warned that if a better report on both the Mixed & Infant Schools be not received next year they will be requested to leave." On being put to the vote the Amendment was lost by five to two. The original motion was then put & carried by a majority of five votes to two.

It was further **resolved** "that the Corresponding Manager do send a copy of the above resolution to Mr & Mrs DEAKIN, and advertise for Teachers in the usual way.

It was proposed by the Vicar, seconded by Mr Robert JAMES and carried unanimously That Julia S. DALE be appointed as a Candidate for the office of Pupil Teacher on probation as approved in the Report of the Board of education.

It was the expressed opinion of the managers that it would be better not to choose a man & wife as Teachers. (*signed*) Ambrose M. FOSTER, Chairman. Sept. 9 1892.

High Littleton National School.

A Meeting of the Managers was held in the Schoolroom on Tuesday Evening September 20th 1892.

Present - The Vicar in the Chair, Mr S.J. BODY, Mr G.E. COWEN, Mr James COX, Mr Robert JAMES, Mr C. POW and Colonel SCOBELL.

The Vicar reported that he had sent a copy of the Resolution passed on Sept. 9th, requesting Mr & Mrs DEAKIN to resign, to Mr & Mrs DEAKIN. He had also conversed with Mr DEAKIN & understood from him that it was customary for notice to be given on either side at the end of a month when the month's salary was paid. He fully anticipated that the resignation would be received in due course & three months notice be given.

Assuming that Mr & Mrs DEAKIN would leave at Christmas, the Managers then consulted together as to the best way to arrange the School Staff; and it was **resolved** that, unless objections were raised by the Education Department, the whole School should be put under one Master & that the Infants should be considered a department of the mixed school & not as a separate School. And it was therefore **resolved** that the Corresponding Manager should advertise both in the "School Master" & the School Guardian for a Certificated principal Master for the whole school, offering him fifty pounds & one third of the Annual Examination Grant & the School House, also for a Certificated Assistant Mistress for the Infant department at a salary of fifty pounds. The amount of Salary was fixed after a full discussion of the probable receipts & expenditure for the current year.

It was thought that it would be well, with the consent of the Educ'n Department to let the Staff consist of:

- i. A Certificated Master in charge of the whole School, mixed & infants.
- ii. A Certificated Mistress for the Infant Department.
- iii. An Assistant Teacher, under Article 68.
- iv, v. and two Pupil Teachers or a Pupil Teacher & a Monitor

It was agreed that the Probationer Pupil Teacher Julia DALE should receive Two Shillings a week as Stipend.

It was proposed by Col. SCOBELL & seconded by Mr G.E. COWEN that Mr Thomas EVANS & Mr Henry CHIVERS be invited to become Manager - carried unanimously.

High Littleton National School.

A Meeting of the Managers was held in the Schoolroom on Wednesday Evening October 5th 1892.

Present - Mr James COX, Mr G.E. COWEN, Mr S.J. BODY, Mr Robert JAMES, Mr Henry CHIVERS, Mr Tho's EVANS, Mr C. POW, Mr C. DOMAN, Mr J. HARRISON, Colonel SCOBELL, & the Vicar in *[the]* chair. The only Manager absent was Mr George CARTER who was away from home.

The Minutes of the last meeting were read.

The Chairman reported that, (contrary to his expectation, expressed at the last meeting), Mr DEAKIN had told him privately that he was not going to send in his resignation, & that consequently formal notice had been given him on Sept. 30th. He had had some conversation with Mr DEAKIN, who stated plainly that he intended to contest the legality of the notice, and to agitate in every way he could to oppose the decision of the Managers. Mr DEAKIN had also stated that an effort would be made ere long to obtain an expression of opinion from the Parish with regard to the advisability of forming a School board.

In view of this threatened legal action the Chairman informed those present that, owing to negligence, no notice had been given to Mr John HARRISON, one of the Managers, of the meeting at which it was resolved that Mr & Mrs DEAKIN should be requested to leave. It was feared that this failure to give notice to one of the Managers of the meeting would render that meeting not technically legal. A letter supporting this view was read by Colonel SCOBELL from Chancellor PARISH of Chichester, and the Chairman read from the Law Times of March 19 1892 the report of a case LANE v NORMAN, which also made it probable that in this case the failure to give one of the Managers notice, rendered the resolution passed at that meeting invalid. After some conversation the Managers decided to assume that the former meeting was not legal, & consequently the whole matter of H.M. Inspector's Report was reconsidered. The Report was read aloud by the Chairman & so was Mr DEAKIN's written explanation of the poor report received.

A good deal of discussion then took place with regard to the unpunctuality of Children. Mr S.J. BODY gave the numbers of children who had passed into School late. Mr Henry CHIVERS thought that it would be more easy for children to be punctual in the afternoons if School began at 2 p.m. instead of 1.30 p.m. The Chairman expressed an opinion that Mr DEAKIN was not a good Disciplinarian & that he had failed to get the children in hand. The fact was recognised that the action of the Managers had been misunderstood in the Parish & that it had been generally assumed that they had been influenced by political considerations. This was once more disavowed. The new Managers Messrs CHIVERS & EVANS expressed much surprise at the character of the Report.

At length it was proposed by Mr James COX "That Mr & Mrs DEAKIN be given notice that their Engagement as Master of the Mixed School & Mistress of the Infant School respectively will cease on January 31st 1893 & that they must give up possession of the School House at the same time." This was Seconded by Mr S.J. BODY & carried by eight votes to one, after an amendment had been proposed by Mr Thomas EVANS, which however found no seconder.

As the Notice would not expire for nearly four months it was thought well not to select new Teachers at present, though many answers had been received to an Advertisement.

Mr Thomas EVANS proposed & Mr BODY seconded "that Mr Enoch YOUNG be invited to become a Manager" and this was carried unanimously.

High Littleton National School

A Meeting of the Managers was held in the Schoolroom on Monday October 24th [1892] at six o'clock.

Present - Colonel SCOBELL, Messrs J. HARRISON, Thomas EVANS, Enoch YOUNG, Henry CHIVERS, Robert JAMES, S.J. BODY, G.E. COWEN, C. DOMAN, James COX, & the Vicar in the Chair. Mr George CARTER was also present during the latter part of the Meeting.

The Chairman announced that the meeting had been called to receive a Petition from the Parents of some of the children who attend the school. The Petition was then laid on the table by Mr Tho's EVANS & read aloud by the Chairman. It ran as follows:

"We the undersigned, parents of children attending High Littleton National School are quite satisfied with the progress our children are making under the care of Mr & Mrs DEAKIN. We would therefore urge upon the

School Committee to reconsider their determination to dismiss them with a view to altering the same." The names of seventy seven Parents or Guardians were signed in favour of this petition, one name appeared against, and the names of four others were written as neutral.

A general discussion then took place. Several managers expressed an opinion that as the subject had been fully discussed twice already with the Report & Mr DEAKIN's written reply before them, there was no need for further consideration. Some questions were put to Mr EVANS with a view to making clear to what extent the Parents had been influenced, if at all, in obtaining the signatures. It was emphatically stated that the Parents had signed freely & intelligently.

Mr Tho's EVANS & Mr YOUNG both spoke in favour of the Petition, & recapitulated several of the explanations given in Mr DEAKIN's document to account for the poor report. Colonel SCOBELL expressed his regret and surprise that Mr DEAKIN had not acted in a more conciliatory spirit. He might have asked the Managers to reconsider the matter, instead of at once declaring his intention of contesting the legality of their action & of agitating to bring pressure to bear on them.

Mr EVANS thought it unfair that Mr DEAKIN had not had an opportunity of personal explanation or defence. It was pointed out to him that Mr DEAKIN, in his application for an increase of Salary, which was sent to the Vicar before the Managers' Meeting on September 9th, had written a long document to explain the reasons for the poor report, and with this written explanation before them, there had seemed to be no need to ask Mr DEAKIN to meet the Managers.

It was then proposed by Mr Thomas EVANS & seconded by Mr Enoch YOUNG that the Resolution to give Mr & Mrs DEAKIN notice be rescinded, But on it's being put to the vote this resolution was lost by eight votes to two. Mr EVANS again expressed his strong feeling that it would have been much more satisfactory if Mr DEAKIN had been asked to come before the managers, & explained that Mr DEAKIN was at that time waiting at home so that he might be ready to come if sent for. As this had not been understood by the Managers before, it seemed well to them, though rather out of place after the resolution had been put, to send for Mr DEAKIN. A resolution to this effect was proposed by Mr COWEN, seconded by Mr EVANS & carried without any opposition.

A message was consequently sent to Mr DEAKIN and he at once attended. The Chairman briefly reminded him that on two separate occasions the Managers, on the strength of the Report of H.M. Inspector, had passed a Resolution giving him & Mrs DEAKIN notice to leave, & invited him if he wished to do so to comment upon the Report. Mr DEAKIN expressed his perfect willingness to answer any charges made against him, and proceeded to review the history of the school since 1884. He quoted from the Report of H.M. Inspector in each year, showing that the school had long been in an unsatisfactory state. He then compared in detail the reports of 1890, 1891 & the present year, attempting to show that he had corrected faults & failings which had been pointed out in the preceding years.

Being subsequently questioned as to punctual attendance of Children, he claimed that the attendances of High Littleton Children would bear comparison with any other country school. He alluded to the new Subjects taught & the success in the Drawing Examination. No manager having any further questions to ask him, Mr DEAKIN was about to withdraw when the Chairman asked him whether the Managers were to infer, from his having come & offered an explanation of the Report & vindication of his Management of the School, that he wished them to reconsider their resolution. On the question being repeated, Mr DEAKIN at first said that he put himself in the hands of the people. On it's being pointed out that his engagement was with the Managers & not with the people, he replied that if the Managers rescinded their resolution he should stay, but that if they did not he supposed he should have to go. He then withdrew. The Managers then further but briefly discussed the matter.

It was felt that Mr DEAKIN had not added much to his former written explanation, and that as he had not expressed any wish, though invited to do so, that the Managers should reconsider their resolution; there was nothing more to be done. No further resolution was brought forward, & the meeting closed.

High Littleton National School.

A Meeting of the Managers was held in the Schoolroom on Monday Evening November 7th 1892.

Present - Messrs James COX, G.E. COWEN, S.J. BODY, Enoch YOUNG, Thomas EVANS, Henry CHIVERS, George CARTER, & the Vicar in the Chair.

The minutes of the preceding meeting were read and confirmed.

Mr DEAKIN had asked permission to be present when the minutes were read that he might make a few remarks upon them; and, being invited to do so, he now explained that though the minutes recorded the impression made on the minds of the Managers by his words, it was not the impression which he had meant to leave. If he had more fully understood what was expected of him at that meeting he would have spoken differently. And he then asked the Managers to consider his application for the Mastership, pleading the fact that his Father & Brother had followed him into the neighbourhood & become part of his household. He then withdrew.

The Chairman reported that Mrs DEAKIN had been offered the appointment of Mistress in Welton Infant School & that as it was important that that School should have a Mistress at once, & as Mrs DEAKIN was extremely anxious not to lose this opportunity of obtaining work in the neighbourhood, he had consulted several of the Managers & after arranging with Mr DEAKIN to take the Supervision of the Infant School, had given Mrs DEAKIN permission to leave at once. This permission was now endorsed by the Managers present. A Letter was read from Mrs DEAKIN thanking the Managers for their permission.

The Managers then proceeded to consider the applications of candidates for the Mastership. Colonel SCOBELL was unable to be present, but he had read through the 43 applications & made notes on them. The former decision not to appoint a man & his wife as Master & Mistress was still felt to be wise & this disposed of several of the applicants. Also it was thought well to select a man of some experience. After a long time spent in reading applications & testimonials, several names were selected & the Corresponding Manager was requested to write further to them.

Mr W.H. MARTIN was selected by Col. SCOBELL as the best man & as he was known to Mr BODY & came from a good School at Bath, it was decided to invite him to come over & see the Managers.

A Meeting of the Managers was held in the Schoolroom on Monday Evening November 14th 1892.

Present - Messrs James COX, S.J. BODY, G.E. COWEN, Enoch YOUNG, Henry CHIVERS, Thomas EVANS & the Vicar in the Chair.

The Minutes of the preceding meeting were read & confirmed.

The Chairman reported that in accordance with the decision of the last meeting Mr W.H. MARTIN had been invited to come over & meet the Managers & that he had come over on the previous Saturday. It was proposed by the Vicar & seconded by Mr S.J. BODY that Mr William Henry MARTIN be appointed Master of the School from Christmas next at a Salary of £50 & one third of the Grant & the Schoolhouse. This was carried unanimously. It was thought advisable that a written agreement should be signed between the Managers & the Master.

As no suitable candidate for the Infant Department was before the Managers it was decided to advertise again. The necessity of being able to suggest some suitable lodging for the Mistress was considered. Some further discussion as to the time at which the school should open in the afternoon took place.

The Managers then considered the advisability of providing some additional heating apparatus for the East end of the larger room & it was decided to make enquiries with regard to a Stove.

A meeting of the School Managers was held in the Schoolroom on Monday evening December 19th 1892.

Present - Messrs S.J. BODY, H'y CHIVERS, G.E. COWEN, James COX, Tho's EVANS, Enoch YOUNG, & the Vicar in the Chair.

The Minutes of the preceding Meeting were read & confirmed.

Mr S.J. BODY proposed & Mr H'y CHIVERS seconded that Mrs Louisa GARRETT be appointed Assistant Mistress of the Infant Department at a Salary of £56 p. ann. This was carried unanimously after a little discussion had taken place with regard to the amount of Salary. It was assumed from the fact that no other reply had been received to the advertisement, & from other information that Certificated Mistresses expected more than the sum named £50. And Mrs GARRET/T had promised to come if her rent were paid in addition to the £50. The Managers decided however, as above, to offer more salary instead of promising to pay rent.

It was proposed by Mr COX & seconded by Mr Tho's EVANS that an attendance of Five should form a Quorum at Meetings of the Managers.

A Meeting of the School Managers was held in the Schoolroom on Monday Evening July 3rd 1893.

Present - Messrs S.J. BODY, H'y CHIVERS, G.E. COWEN, Tho's EVANS, Robert JAMES and the Vicar in the Chair.

The minutes of the preceding Meeting were read and confirmed. And the Managers then proceeded to prepare Form IX with a View to the Visit of H.M. Inspector. The Schedules were compared with the Registers and the accounts were present[ed]. Mr John MELHUIISH kindly attended & audited the accounts.

A Form sent from the Education Department was signed by the Managers authorising the payment of the Fee Grant through the Bristol Branch of the WILTS. & DORSET Banking Co. & their London Agents the LONDON & WESTMINSTER Bank.

A Meeting of the School Managers was held in the Schoolroom on Friday Evening August 18th 1893, at 7 p.m.

Present - Mr S.J. BODY, Mr Henry CHIVERS, Mr Robert JAMES, Colonel SCOBELL, Mr Enoch YOUNG & the Vicar in the Chair.

The minutes of the preceding meeting were read & confirmed.

The Report of H.M. Inspector received from the Education Department was read. Mr BODY who had been present at the Inspection also reported the verbal recommendations of H.M. Inspector. The Report seemed to make two points clear:

- i. The School staff must be strengthened, and
 - ii. The School premises must be enlarged, in consequence of the increased average attendance.
- (i) after discussion on the first point it was proposed by Col. SCOBELL & seconded by Mr Rob't JAMES that two candidates on Probation, a Boy & a Girl, should be appointed; and the Chairman was requested to take steps to find such Candidates.
- (ii) The Second subject led to much discussion, as the Education Dep't recommended additional Ventilation, new Cloakrooms, new Drainage etc., and a new Infant School, so that the present infant School might be used as a Classroom for the Mixed School. To carry out even a part of these structural alterations would involve a considerable outlay. It was decided to make immediate enquiries as to the possibility of acquiring additional land, and the meeting was adjourned to Weds. Aug. 23rd in the hope that a fuller attendance of the Managers might be secured.

An adjourned Meeting of the School Managers was held in the Schoolroom on Wednesday, Aug. 23rd 1893, at 5 p.m.

Present Mr S.J. BODY, Mr H'y CHIVERS, Mr G.E. COWEN, Mr Ja's COX, Mr Rob't JAMES, Colonel SCOBELL, Mr Enoch YOUNG, & the Vicar in the Chair.

The Minutes of the preceding Meeting were read & confirmed.

Referring to the business which had been discussed at the former meeting, the Chairman reported that he had made enquiries with regard to the qualifications & character of Charles BODY; he had seem Mr WORRELL [S.W. WARRELL, Master of Farmborough School] & read a letter from him & from the Rector of Farmborough, both speaking highly of the boy. It was unanimously decided that, subject to the Consent of the Educ'n Dep't, Charles BODY be appointed a Candidate for the Office of Pupil Teacher on Probation at a salary of 2s/6d. each week. The Chairman reported that as Julia DALE had failed in her 6th Standard Exam., she could no longer represent 20 children on the staff & that in consequence another girl must be found; he had made enquiries & hoped soon to find a suitable candidate.

Passing afterwards to the consideration of the Enlargement of the School accommodation, it was found that considerable diversities of opinion existed. The Managers had, previous to the beginning of the meeting, walked round the premises to see how the alterations could be carried out. It was felt by all to be a hardship, that we should have to enlarge our School because it was attended by some Children from other Parishes; it was calculated that thirty or forty Children from Clutton & Farmborough Parishes attended the High Littleton School. If these children were sent away the School accommodation would be sufficient unless Hallatrow Children attending other schools were returned to us, but the loss of these Children would mean a loss of £30 or £40 to our Funds. Assuming therefore that an enlargement must be made, there confronted the Parish the grave difficulty of raising the necessary funds. All were agreed that it would be absolutely necessary to select as economical a method as was consistent with efficiency. The Chairman read a letter from Miss REES-MOGG saying that there would be no difficulty in obtaining the small quantity of land adjoining which would probably be required. Two plans of enlargement were suggested, one consisted of lengthening the present building westwards, which would necessitate moving two of the party walls, and the other of building the new room at right angles to the west end of the present building. It was acknowledged that plans must be prepared for submission to the Education Department.

Mr S.J. BODY proposed & the Chairman seconded "that Mr W. BIRD, Architect of Midsomer Norton, should be consulted as to his terms for drawing up plans according to the requirements of the Code", but on it's being put to the Vote, this motion was lost, many of the Managers fearing to incur the expense of Architect's fees.

Mr COWEN then proposed & Colonel SCOBELL seconded "that Mr INGS, Builder of Paulton, should be consulted as to his terms for drawing plans according to the requirements of the Code, whether they were accepted or not." On being put to the vote this was carried.

A Meeting of the Managers was held in the Schoolroom on Wednesday, October 11th 1893, at 7 p.m.
Present - Messrs S.J. BODY, H'y CHIVERS, James COX, C. DOMAN, Tho's EVANS, Colonel SCOBELL, Mr Enoch YOUNG, & the Vicar in the Chair.
The Minutes of the preceding meeting were read & confirmed.

The Chairman reported that a letter had been received from the Educ'n Department declining to recognise Charles BODY and Julia DALE on the school staff. Also a letter from Mr S.J. BODY giving notice of the termination of his son's engagement as Monitor. It was decided to make no alteration in the staff until the Girls' list of the Queen's Scholarship Exam. was published, as Miss DEAKIN's position depended upon the result. But the Corresponding Manager was authorised if necessary to advertise for a transfer P.T. or Ex. P.T.

Plans for the proposed enlargement of the School buildings were presented & a rough estimate placing the cost at £300 exclusive of land & conveyance, & of furnishing was handed in. After considerable discussion it was proposed by Colonel SCOBELL, seconded by Mr COX & carried, that the matter of the new Buildings rest over until the end of the present Coal dispute but that necessary repairs be carried out at once & that Col. SCOBELL, Mr COX, Mr BODY & the Chairman should form a Subcommittee to see to this work.

It was proposed by Mr COX, seconded by Mr EVANS & carried unanimously that Mr Thomas BLANNING of Hallatrow be invited to become a Manager.

A Meeting of the Managers was held at the Vicarage on Tuesday Even'g Dec'r 5th 1893.

The Minutes of the preceding Meeting were read and confirmed.

Arising out of those minutes the Chairman reported that Miss DEAKIN had failed in her Scholarship Exam'n, & as this rendered an increase of staff necessary he had advertised for an assistant. In reply to the fourth advertisement one application had been received from Miss E. PULLIN. Her letters & testimonials were read and the Managers ratified her appointment at a Salary of £45 per annum.

The Subcommittee reported that a contract for Ventilation, & for new Glazing of the School windows had been accepted & that the work was in progress. Plans for enlarging the School buildings were then discussed. The

Corresponding Manager was requested to write to the Education Dep't to ask questions with regard to extra parochial Scholars.

It was thought well to defer the proposed Parish Meeting until further enquiries had also been made as to the possibility of procuring land for the extension of the School buildings in line with the present schoolrooms, as some of the Managers considered that this would be a cheaper & less unsightly plan than having a gable end towards the road.

The Chairman reported that Miss DEAKIN was shortly going to be married & that she had given a month's notice to resign her engagement as Assistant Mistress on Jan. 31st. Also that Miss E. The Chairman was authorised to advertise for a Mistress under Art. 50 at £45 per annum & for another under Art. 68 at £30 per annum.

It was agreed that Elizabeth QUARMAN's Salary should be raised to 3s./- per week from Jan. 1st.

After some discussion it was agreed that the Plans for the enlargement of the School should be completed. The Chairman was authorised to prepare a draft circular for subsequent circulation among the Ratepayers stating the needs & conditions of the School difficulty. He also undertook to find out what subscriptions could be obtained from Non ratepayers & leading well wishers in the Neighbourhood.

With regard to Assistant Teachers the Chairman reported that Miss COX had been teaching in the School for a time on a month's trial; it was decided to give her a little longer trial before risking another change.

Also the Chairman reported that after advertising several times & corresponding with several Ex Pupil Teachers, only one applicant remained; her testimonials were read & considered satisfactory and Miss Violet MURRAY was appointed Assistant Mistress under Art. 50 at a salary of £45 per annum.

The managers then passed to the consideration of the matter of the enlargement of the School Buildings. The Chairman read a draft circular to be sent to Ratepayers, as arranged at the previous meeting; this was approved of & the Chairman was authorised to sign it on behalf of the managers. Plans of the new Room not being ready, after some discussion it was thought better to employ a competent Architect, and Mr G.E. COWEN proposed & the Chairman seconded that Mr W. BIRD of Midsomer Norton be asked to prepare plans for the Enlargement & requested to state his fee for the plans if the work should not be executed, and this was passed unanimously.

It was also decided to call a Parish Meeting that the feeling of the Ratepayers might be ascertained.

The general opinion was strongly in favour of continuing the present school & a considerable proportion of the Ratepayers had expressed their willingness to contribute a voluntary rate of 6d. in 20s./- for five years if all the others would do the same. Some had expressly stated that they would not give anything & it was therefore uncertain whether the promises would be acknowledged. The Chairman announced that promises had been received amounting to nearly £250. All the

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managers present then signed a document pledging themselves to pay a voluntary rate of 6d. in 20/- for three years, and Mr COWEN undertook to endeavour to obtain further signatures to the same effect.

Plans of the proposed alterations were produced & it was thought necessary to send specifications with the plans. The Chairman was requested to communicate with Mr W.F. BIRD & to ask him to prepare specifications as economically as was consistent with a satisfactory result. The Chairman was also requested to communicate with Mr W. REES-MOGG relative to the purchase & conveyance of the adjoining land.

1894. A Meeting of the School Managers was held at the Vicarage on Monday Evening July 23rd at 6.30 p.m.
Present - Colonel SCOBELL, Messrs BLANNING, BODY & COWEN & the Vicar in the Chair.
The Minutes of the prece(e)ding Meeting were read & confirmed.

Mr COWEN reported that he had obtained the signatures of many of the largest ratepayers - whose names were read - to the document mentioned in the last meeting; he estimated that these names represented about £50 per ann. for three years.

The Chairman read some letters from Messrs REES-MOGG & DAVY, informing the managers that the Misses REES-MOGG would make an additional donation to the Enlargement Fund of £3, the price of the additional land to be purchased; also asking for instructions as to the terms of the Conveyance.

Mr W.F. BIRD, Architect, attended & explained the plans & asked for instructions on a few matters of detail. He strongly recommended that if possible all the work should be carried out at one time. And after some discussion, & considering that the promises already received were sufficient to justify the hope that there would be little difficulty in raising the whole amount in two or three years, it was **resolved** that tenders should be obtained for the whole work as soon as possible & Mr BIRD was requested to prepare specifications & ask for tenders.

The Managers then prepared & signed Form IX & the other necessary papers for the visit of H.M. Inspector on July 30th.

The Chairman also reported that he had provisionally appointed Miss Clara M. BULL as Assistant Mistress at a salary of £30. After her testimonials had been read the meeting confirmed the appointment.

Tenders for carrying out the Enlargement of the School buildings according to the plans & specifications of Mr W.F. BIRD were then opened, & found to be as follows:

Mr James COX & Mr W'm HEDGES (who was present by the permission of the managers) declined to sign any such promise, but they both promised by word of mouth that they also would pay this rate.

It was then proposed by Mr S.J. BODY & seconded by Mr G.E. COWEN that the tender of Mr A.W.J. CATLEY for £445 be accepted, and this was carried nem. con. It was arranged that the Chairman should inform Mr W.F. BIRD of this fact & request him to prepare a contract for signature at a future meeting.

A letter was read from Mrs GARRETT the Infants' Mistress applying for an increase of Salary. On the proposition of Mr G.E. COWEN seconded by Mr T. EVANS it was unanimously agreed that Mrs GARRETT's salary be increased from £56 to £66 per annum to date from July 1st 1894.

A letter was also read from Mr W.H. MARTIN, headmaster, applying for an increase of Salary. But the Managers, while expressing their warm appreciation of Mr MARTIN's work, did not feel justified in sanctioning any further increase of Expenditure at present.

The Chairman also reported that Miss BULL had had to leave suddenly from ill health, and it was arranged to advertise immediately for an Assistant under Art. 68.

The Monitress Elizabeth QUARMAN applied for an increase of Salary & the Managers decided to raise her Salary to 4s./6d. a week.

There was also some consultation with regard to the Enlargement Fund.

The Chairman then read an application for the post of Assistant Mistress from Miss Jane HAM, and, as the testimonials which were read were satisfactory, she was appointed an Assistant Mistress at a salary of £25 with the promise of an additional bonus of £5 if satisfactory progress be made by the children under her care.

It was agreed that the payment of the School cleaner should be increased to 4 Shillings a week and that she should scrub the Schools once a month & keep the windows clean & have the rain shoots cleared when necessary.

Mr COX proposed & Mr BLANNING seconded that Mr CANTLE's estimates for work at the School House Interior £6.15. 0 and exterior £2.10. 0 should be accepted & that he should be requested to make good the shooting under the same agreement.

A letter was read from Messrs SPACKMAN & Son, agents for the Earl of WARWICK, offering a Donation of £10 to the Special School Exp's & in future years an Annual Subscription of £5, on condition that the Earl of WARWICK "has the right to nominate a member of the Committee". It was decided to inform Messrs SPACKMAN & Son that the Managers were willing to invite Mr WATSON, whom the Earl of WARWICK wished to nominate, to join the board of management but that they could not recognise the principle that the kindly offered subscription, which was less than 2 per cent on the annual Expenditure, should confer "the right to nominate a member of the committee". The Corresponding Manager was requested to write to Messrs SPACKMAN & Son to this effect & to express a hope that this would meet the wishes of the Earl of WARWICK.

Mr COX complained that the boundary Ditch between the properties of Mrs MOGG & the Misses REES-MOGG had been partially filled up by the Contractor for the School enlargement. Mr BODY explained that the work was not yet completed & that no injury would be done to the boundary.

The Annual Report from the Education Department just received was read.

Raising North Boundary Wall - Mr Robert JAMES proposed & Mr WATSON seconded that the Tender of Mr W. SAGE for £3. 7. 6 be accepted. This was carried nem. con.

School Drainage - Discussion was held with regard to the best way of abating a nuisance in connection with [the] drain from the School, Schoolhouse & Vicarage. It was proposed by Mr WATSON & seconded by Mr R. JAMES "That the attention of Mr H.H. PURNELL, Inspector of Nuisances, be called to the Nuisance, & that the matter be brought before the District Council." Carried nem. con.

Attendance of Children - It was reported by Mr W.H. MARTIN, the Schoolmaster, that the attendance of the children was not satisfactory, & that the standard of the Justices was not high enough to make the attendance officer's reports sufficient to enforce a satisfactory attendance. The master was authorised to put into a lower Standard, or not to raise to a higher Standard those children, who were so irregular as to justify such arrangement.

Assistant Teacher's Salary - It was proposed by Mr R. JAMES & seconded by Mr BLANNING that Miss M.J. HAM's Salary be raised to £35 per annum. Carried.

Proposed by the Rev. A.M. FOSTER & seconded by Mr R. JAMES, that Miss Annie SAUNDERS be appointed Assistant Teacher under Art. 68 at a Salary of £15 per annum. Carried.

A Meeting of the School Managers was held in the Schoolroom at 7.45 p.m. on Wednesday January 19th 1898.

Present - Colonel SCOBELL, Messrs BODY & COX & the Vicar in the Chair.

The Minutes of the preceding meeting were read & confirmed.

Special Aid Grant under Voluntary Schools Act 1897 - The Vicar read a memorandum from the Education Department announcing that a sum of £60 had been granted under this Act to be used "for the purpose of improvement of Staff and Apparatus." The memorandum added "It is to be understood that the Grant is made in respect of the current financial year only, and it must not be assumed that the School will necessarily receive a similar grant in future years." It was seen that these conditions made the apportionment of the Grant somewhat difficult.

The Headmaster was asked to state what improvements in apparatus were most necessary. He also expressed his opinion as to the question of the improvement of the Staff. He was then asked to withdraw & the managers discussed the subject. Colonel SCOBELL proposed & Mr James COX seconded the following proposition "That a Bonus be given to each of the Teachers for the current year to the following amounts - Mr MARTIN £10, Mrs GARRETT £10, Miss LIGHT £5, Miss HAM £4, Miss QUARMAN £3 & Miss SAUNDERS £3; and that about £25 be spent in Books, a New Cupboard, Blinds for the South Windows in the Large Schoolroom and the Class Room, and in repairing the School Yard or playground." This proposition was carried; Col. SCOBELL, Mr COX & Mr FOSTER voted for it & Mr BODY voted against it.

Mr BODY expressed his opinion that it would be better to improve the staff by the appointment of a qualified Assistant Teacher in the place of one of the Additional Teachers.

Notices were duly sent out for a **Managers' Meeting** to be held on Wednesday July 6th 1898. But only Mr S.J. BODY and the Correspondent attended & consequently no formal business could be transacted, though Form IX had to be prepared & signed. (signed) A.M. FOSTER, Correspondent.

A **Quorum of Five** was established at a Meeting on 19th Dec. 1892. However, meetings were held from 1896 onwards with less than this number.

Notices were duly sent out for a **Managers' Meeting** to be held on Friday August 5th 1898. But only Mr S.J. BODY, & Mr M. WATSON, & the Correspondent were present. It was nevertheless thought well to ask for Tenders for Painting & Cleaning the Schools. (signed) A.M. FOSTER.

A **Meeting of the Managers** was summoned for Friday Evening August 12 '98 & though only Mr S.J. BODY, Mr M. WATSON & the Vicar were present it was felt necessary to transact business.

Tenders for Painting & Cleaning the School were presented & read. Mr S.J. BODY proposed & Mr WATSON seconded that the lowest Tender, that of Mr Alfred SMITH of Timsbury for £10.13.10 be accepted. Carried.

It was decided to Transfer the School Banking a/c to STUCKEY's Banking Co. at Midsomer Norton for the convenience of the Teachers & local Tradesmen in obtaining payment.

The Annual Report of the Education Department was read. It showed a grant earned of £200.19. 6 as against £190. 6. 0 in the previous year.

A Meeting of the Managers was held in the Schoolroom on Tuesday July 10th 1900.

Present - Col. SCOBELL, Mr WATSON, Mr H'y CHIVERS & the Vicar.

The Minutes of the last Meeting were read & signed. The Chairman explained that Managers' Meetings had been called several times during the previous two years but that a sufficient number had never attended to form a quorum. The total Grant amounted to £201.19. 9. It was pointed out that from this sum had been deducted by the Education Department the sum of £6. 5. 0, being the amount of contributions of Mr W.H. MARTIN (£3.15. 0) & Mrs GARRETT (£2.10. 0) under the Superannuation Act 1898, which sums would be deducted from their salaries.

The Amount of Special Aid Grant was £50 - £35 for maintenance of increased Salaries of Teachers & £15 for New Desks.

A letter was read from Miss E.A. LIGHT giving notice that she would resign her post as Assistant Mistress under Article 50 at the end of the year. It was also stated that another teacher was probably going to leave at the same time but no notice of this had as yet been received. The Correspondent was authorised to advertise for an Assistant Teacher under Article 50 at a Salary of £50.
